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FREE MK COUNSELING AVAILABLE

MISSIONARY COUNSELING & SUPPORT SERVICE

The purpose of the Missionary Counseling and Support Services (MCSS) is to provide counseling to families on furlough, students in colleges and seminaries, and others who have returned permanently so that their transition to their new situation is a more positive one.

We provide personal care and understanding to each person through a variety of counseling situations. Our goal is to help them find a satisfactory personal and cultural identity. Among the issues we deal with are: loneliness, identity crisis, anxiety, life in another culture, sadness, culture shock, alienation, lack of permanency, feelings of confusion, sense of belonging, peer pressure, value differences, feeling a stranger to one's own family, separation and loss.

In-depth, personal counseling is provided by a counselor who has experienced the missionary lifestyle and possesses keen insight into the problems and challenges faced by these families. Because each family has its own unique needs, the counselor will adapt the counseling service to each client's situation.

Counseling sessions may be conducted on an individual or group basis with those family members who feel the need for this type of assistance. If it is not feasible for family members to travel to our Counseling Center in Winston-Salem, arrangements can be made to conduct sessions by phone.

MCSS will respond as quickly as is feasible. MCSS may be reached 24 hours a day. There is no charge for missionary children for these services and fees to families are made on a negotiable basis.

Early registration is encouraged as there will be a late fee for registering after May 30. The purpose of this late fee is to encourage advance registration so that we can accurately project the number of needed rooms and meals, since the college will hold us financially responsible to within a narrow range of our estimated count.

If you cannot come, please complete the back of the registration form as indicated. Send photos, if you like. We will have a bulletin board where these forms and photos will be posted. We need your address, and addresses of others you might have, to update our mailing list, so please be sure at least to send your address!!

The following information for the reunion is listed alphabetically:

ADDRESS UPDATES:

Be sure to bring your address books to the reunion. John Price will be at or near the registration table with his lists for you to check. Make any address corrections (that you are <u>sure</u> of) for family and friends.

BABY-SITTING:

We will try to arrange baby-sitters from a nearby church to watch your children in your rooms or a lounge if one is available. Check at the Information Booth near the registration table. You will pay the baby-sitter directly at an agreed upon rate.

CAMPING INFO:

Available upon request. Call or write to Connie Gary.

"CURFEW"

Residence halls are locked at midnight and open at 7:00 am. Desk attendants can make arrangements for you to enter during those hours with advance notice.

DEPOSITS & PRE-PAYMENT:

We need to give Wheaton deposits on the rooms and meals well before the reunion begins. The committee members have used their own money for this purpose. To meet the school deposits and reimburse the committee we are encouraging pre-payment and also partial pre-payment. As an incentive to pre-pay we are offering a FREE 3-color reunion T-SHIRTTOEVERYFAMILY MEMBER THAT YOU PRE-PAY by May 30. (Thank you to Jim and Shari Ardill for the production and design of the T-shirt). Please note that there is a penalty for not pre-registering. To be pre-registered you must pay at least \$30 per person.

INSURANCE:

As they always have in the past, Wheaton College requires that our organization carry insurance for our group for the weekend. This cost is about \$3 per person per day. Even if you are not staying in the dorm, we need to cover you so we need to collect for this at registration. Children 0-12 are half-price.

KEYS:

Two keys are issued per room. A deposit of \$12 per key will be refunded at the end of the reunion when you turn in your keys.

LINEN:

Two sheets, one pillowcase, two bath towels, two hand towels, and one washcloth are provided. Beds come furnished with one pillow and one blanket. Hangers are in limited supply. Soap and drinking cups are furnished.

MEALS:

Package for the entire weekend: (You will receive a plastic meal CARD) The weekend consists of:

Thursday dinner Friday breakfast, lunch, dinner Saturday breakfast, lunch, dinner Sunday breakfast, lunch

Adults Meal Package: \$50.00 Children (3-7) are half price: \$25.00 Children under 2 are free (must be accompanied by adult)

Individual meals are discouraged by the school but are available. (You will buy a single meal **TICKET**, at the registration table, **not** at the dining

nall)
Breakfast: \$4.00
Lunch: \$6.00

Dinner: \$8.00

PARKING:

Free parking is available. You will be issued a parking permit when you register if you are staying overnight. If you need to park for the day only, you do not need a permit. Park in designated areas only to avoid getting a ticket. RV motor vehicle homes may not be used for housing accommodations while parked on College premises.

PHOTO SESSION:

Please note that this is at a different day and time than usual. We are still hoping that we can get someone that is not a participant to take photos for us so that no one gets left out.

POOL:

Tickets are sold on an individual basis for \$1.50 per person per pool use or \$3.50 for the week.

ROOMS:

Rooms are arranged in suites with two double rooms sharing a bathroom. Bathroom doors do not lock; arrange a system of knocking with your suitemates. If you want to share a room or suite with family or someone in particular please let Connie know and she will arrange it if she can. (Almost all rooms have bunk beds.)

ROOM RATES:

Double \$17.50 per night, per person 3 nights = \$52.50 Single \$23.00 per night, per person 3 nights = \$69.00 Rates for children 12 and under: 1/2 price if they share the same SUITE as the adult with them.

No charge for children under 7 in a sleeping bag or bassinet. (But no linen will be provided.)

At this time there are no rooms available on campus for the night before (Wednesday) or the last night (Sunday) of the reunion. There are a few people who have volunteered their homes for anyone who needs a place to say before or after the reunion. These are limited. Please turn the registration form over and check the appropriate boxes. If you live in Wheaton and can provide housing please indicate that too.

TALENT SHOW:

If you want to participate, see Joyce Ward-Eden or Lance Long and note that Friday from 1:30 to 2:30 in the afternoon is your organization time.

TO GET TO WHEATON: BY CAR:

From the south: Take 294 to the eastwest tollway (I-88); take the east-west tollway west and exit at the Wheaton-Naperville exit; go north on Naperville Road to Rt. 38 (Roosevelt Rd.) in Wheaton for approximately three miles; turn right (east) onto Roosevelt Rd. for one block to Washington St.; turn left (north) onto Washington St. The campus is approx. 3/4 mile north on Washington.

From the north: Take North Ave. (Rt.64) to Schmale Rd.; turn south on Schmale Rd. (Schmale become Main St. at the Wheaton line); stay on Main St. to Seminary Ave. (approx. 2 1/4 miles); turn left (east) onto Seminary Ave. The campus is about three blocks east on Seminary Ave.

From the east (Chicago): Take the Eisenhower Expressway to Roosevelt Rd. (Rt. 38) to Wheaton; in Wheaton, turn right (north) onto President St. to College Ave. (approx. one mile); turn left (west) onto College Ave. The campus is about two blocks west on College Ave.

From the west: Take Roosevelt Rd. (Rt. 38) or North Ave. (Rt. 64) east. Follow directions as above from Rt. 38 or Rt. 64.

MK'S OVERCOMING PAIN

Much has been said about the painful experiences of the MK and many of you have voiced that you are tired of the subject. The fact remains that some of us got hurt. However, we need to work through our pain to get over it. How? I went to professional sources to get this answer.

- 1Look the problem in the face to see how it is affecting you now.
- 2 Relieve the incident by verbalizing it in detail.
- 3 Allow yourself to experience the feelings from the past and present.
- 4 Hold responsible the person who caused your pain.

5Realize your current behavioral patterns and plan steps to change them.

6Keep in touch with other MK's, especially those who went through similar experiences.

7 Confront the person who caused your pain. This person may or may not own up to what he/she did but you will be better off. Stand your ground but don't be nasty. (Make sure you've worked through the previous steps prior to this step.)

8 Allow yourself to forgive the person who caused your pain.

9 Start rebuilding your life, self-image and your relationships with others.

10 .. Reach out to others who have gone through similar experiences. I find this helps to make something positive out of something negative.

Something I have found that helps me is to keep a diary of my feelings. I hope these steps help many MK's to work through difficulties and fade away the scars. Pain can be debilitating in so many ways.

BOARDING SCHOOL

From Homesickness To Understanding

I am one of the blessed MK's who never felt abandoned or dysfunctional as a result of my boarding school experience. I wish to extend my sympathy to those who are hurting still because of their experiences. I would like to suggest a few things that might help children through such an experience in the future.

My first few years at boarding school were miserable. I was terribly homesick and cried myself to sleep almost every night the first year. But I did not feel abandoned nor resentful. My later years at boarding school were enjoyable despite continued mild homesickness.

Ibelieve one reason my boarding school experience was not devastating to me in the long run was because my parents allowed me to know that they were just as miserable about the separation as I was. I've heard advice given to parents to act like going to boarding school is no big deal, to be nonchalant and unemotional so their children will be the same way. I think that is terrible advice. My parents agonized over their decision, and I knew it.

They cried when we left, and I knew it. They discussed the experience before, during and afterwards and helped us to adjust, to put up with the unpleasant, to accept the inevitable, and to put the best possible construction on situations that seemed (and often were) unfair, to make allowances and do our best to be upright anyway.

Another thing my parents did was to make our times at home extra-special. They cut their "work" to a minimum during our school vacations so they could spend as much time as possible with us. Trips to the villages were family affairs. We helped in the clinic, even attended some of the classes they held for the nationals. We would have extra-special things (special meals with favorite foods, picnics, excursions, etc.) just before returning to school and when we arrived back at school, each of us always found a little gift wrapped up and hidden in her/his suitcase.

My parents always kept these things in balance. We knew if we truly needed our parents in a desperate way they would find a way to come or else send for us. We knew we were of prime importance in their lives: yet they kept that from being a hindrance to their ministry.

I heard once that the hardest thing for Christians to do is to keep a balance. I believe that is true. I believe a balance needs to be found in the timing of boarding school experience. I agree with a number of others that young children should not be separated from their parents. Security is extremely important to a child's development, and until a child can feel secure away from his parents, he should not be sent to boarding school. I certainly was not ready to leave my parents at the age of six, and I consider it a miracle I survived unscathed. I believe a parent needs to be certain the child

himself feels ready before sending him to boarding school (or any school, for that matter). We treat children the same at the same age with no allowances for individual differences. I hope this will change in our society.

I just wanted to throw out these thoughts in an effort to help stem the tide of hurting MK's, possibly. Interestingly, when I read Letters I Never Wrote I identified with much of it and could have written some of it myself. Perhaps MK's, indeed all human beings, mostly need to learn how to cope with whatever life sends. An early and lasting sense of security and being important to someone must go a long way in developing that ability.

Now I would like to tell you what's happened to the years. You might remember me when I was young at ELWA as a tomboy, or a bookworm, or just an average kid, or maybe you though I was weird. Anyway, ELWA for me was a happy time of my life. My troubles began when we moved back to the USA.

It became obvious as the years passed that my Christian life was mostly a pretence. Behind the backs of my parents, teachers and even my friends, Ilived a secret selfish life. I had accepted Christ as my Savior when I was young so I couldn't live like this for too long without my conscience (the indwelling Holy Spirit) troubling me. I would come back to God because I had to, but I never made a lasting commitment. I was mad at God and felt He hated me. I



especially hated anything the Apostle Paul had to say. I tried to disprove the Bible so I could live the way I wanted to. I was sure I knew what would make me happy. God gave me many of these things but I was still miserable. I nearly destroyed my marriage and I was so depressed I wanted to die. I was sure I would be miserable forever because of the things I felt He was asking me to do, but I was so wrong. He renewed my marriage and He gave me a beautiful son. This is amazing because I never wanted to grow up

myself let alone become a mother. I didn't know how wonderful it could be. I was so impatient and critical of people and He has taken that away and given me love in its place. Everyday He shows me that He loves me in a special way. It's so amazing to me that such a great God can be so intimately involved in so many people's lives all at the same time. Sometimes lask myself, "How did all this happen to me? Why did I drift so far?" I'm pretty sure that only one thing can prevent this and that is to have daily contact through reading His word and through prayer where He can adjust my attitudes, reorder my priorities and values. It's also the one thing that Satan tries the hardest to keep us from because He knows it's our power source. I have heard the average Evangelical Christian only prays two to three minutes a day. Are we MK's content with being average?

SIMROOTS REPRESENTATIVES

SIMROOTS REPS - Some have asked what is involved in being a rep. As a SIMROOTS Rep you become the contact person for your class when they have questions or concerns regarding SIMROOTS. 
