We were severed from nurture, security, support, familiarity, and unconditional love, and in a sense, were suspended in time and space with few (or no) skills or equipment required to understand, much less function, in that state. (To some degree these were provided for us, but rarely in the same way.)

"No wonder!" I thought. No wonder, indeed! How is it to be expected that a child so young should be able to reconnect all this, only this time to strangers, and sadly, not always understanding or kind ones? Out of necessity some of us did. Some of us tried, and some simply couldn't. It makes sense, then, that this disconnection left some of us dealing with issues of abandonment, security, loveability, etc. even as adults. And, it's not only the "troubled" people dealing with these problems. Many of us have established new connections in our marriages and with our own children and still struggle with these basic issues at one time or another.

During the course of our conversation, my friend suggested that it's never too late to re-

Amy Buck, mother of Alton Buck went to be with the Lord on November 15, 1991. She was 92 years young. Dan Buck - B. A. wrote the following letter to his grandmother the day before she died. He faxed it from the ship, the USS Jason, so it could be read at her funeral. The letter contains thoughts and experiences that would be common to many of us who were separated from grandparents during our time overseas.

Dear Grandma Buck,

When I sit down to look back over almost 25 years of memories, and I think of all the people whose paths have crossed mine, again and again my mind comes back to a person whose influence I felt during every one of those years.

Although we spent almost all of that time separated by hundreds or thousands of miles, Grandma, as far back as I can remember, you were there. You came to live with us when Mom went back to work when I was two. I spoke some of my first words sitting at your kitchen table, and you wrote them all down--something I treasure to this day. Before I was even three, you decided that I needed a teddy bear, so you gave me one for Christmas. I loved that little bear so much that seven years later Mom had to sew him a new skin, and I kept him for another five years before deciding I was old enough that I didn't need a teddy bear anymore.

Even in my earliest years I got the feeling from you that as important as it was for a little boy to have a teddy bear, it was much more important to you that I have Jesus at the center of my life. Grandma, the Lord Jesus was always so much the focus of your life that you couldn't keep Him from becoming a part of your relationships with everyone else. Growing up in Africa, I remember getting mail every week or so, a letter from Grandma Buck. It was addressed to my parents of course, but there would be a little section on the bottom of the aerogramme just for me. You always asked me how my relationship was with Jesus, and I knew that if I didn't keep up my devotions I would be answering to you for it.

Although it was through our letters that we kept in contact over the years, from the first one laboriously hand-copied from Mom's dictated example, to the last ones scrawled in my bunk while Scud missiles shot by overhead, there were also visits to your little brown house. The first one I remember was in 1971.

When we returned to Michigan on our first furlough, we looked forward to meeting our relatives after almost four years in Africa. Upon landing at New York, and at every stop on the way to Detroit Metro Airport, I asked of every oldlooking lady I saw, "Is that Grandma Buck, Daddy?" CONGRATULATIONS!

When we came to see you at your little brown house, we were on our best behavior because at your house we had learned about how to be "proper". You taught me so many things in the course of those visits--the joy of reading (remember the little boy under the rocking chair with a **Reader's Digest**?), the lure of crossword puzzles, the value of money, and the importance of friendships. When I ran away that first scary day of school, it was to your house that I went, and there I learned that running away was not the proper way to deal with a problem.

For as long as I can remember, Grandma, my problems and I have been the subject of your thoughts and prayers. Whenever I wrote you a letter, I knew it would find its way into your prayer file. Every February for as long as I can remember, a card has arrived from you with a dollar or two for my birthday. As I grew older, the dollar bills were replaced by checks, and I assumed that I would eventually outgrow that ritual like I did the teddy bear. But when I began a family of my own, the dollars started coming in October as well for Anita, then William, and just last month, for little Andrew, too.

I don't know of any other grandma who pours as much love and care into her great-grandchildren as she does into her grandchildren, but then I always knew you were special, Grandma. You're the only Grandma Buck I will ever have, and my life is immeasurably enriched by the privilege of having been your grandson.

You are going away now, Grandma, and unlike the times when we pulled away from yourlittle brown house, first in my father's various cars, then more recently in my own, this time it is I who am staying behind. Every February, another birthday will remind me that the distance that now separates us can be spanned by neither mail no phone nor even ham radio. But I know I will go to visit Grandma one more time.

Someday, after I have celebrated my final birthday, I will go again to Grandma's house--not the little brown one this time, but the house of her Father and mine, where everything is perfectly proper all the time. We won't need to talk about my problems, and you will no longer be addicted to crossword puzzles! There we can spend all our time talking about--and with--the Lord Jesus, and we will never say goodbye again.

So, Grandma, for the last time, goodbye. I'll see you in Heaven.

Murphy's Law Rules In Africa

If Something Goes Right, Travelers Look For A Catch

Abidjan, Ivory Coast-More than 200 travellers who arrived in this West African capital aboard an Air Afrique flight from Lyon, France not long ago suffered a stiff dose of typical hard luck, Africanstyle.

The trip seemed perfect, at first. The jumbo jet landed on time at Port Bouet Airport and promptly taxied to its appointed stop near the customs and immigration terminal.

But when the passengers descended the plane's stairs to the sweltering tarmac, they found their path blocked by a 75-piece marching band and throngs cf soldiers all dressed in frilly finery who stood at attention guarding a long, red carpet.

The president of Burkina Faso, His Excellency Blaise Compaore, was due to land shortly on a state visit, an immigration official politely explained, and everyone had to show their respect by staying put.

No one could cross the red carpet. No one could stand near the red carpet. No one could even tiptoe around it.

"But the heat, Monsieur!" cried a French tourist, his red cheeks quivering with outrage, as scores of travellers hastily sought refuge beneath the wings of the jet.

"These are the rules. You will wait."

So the travellers waited. And waited. And waited.

His Excellency's plane was very late.

Finally, after nearly 30 minutes in hell, someone came up with a bright idea: If it was forbidden to *walk* across, near or around the red carpet, perhaps the travellers could be *driven* around it.

The official pondered this proposal a moment. He stroked his chin with his hand. Then to the passengers' delight, he nodded and replied, "Oui."

Thus, African protocol was respected, and the travellers found deliverance in the form of a battered, 20-seat minibus that made more than 10 trips around the sweating, marching band, the heat-stricken soldiers and the sacred red carpet to the terminal, barely 150 yards away.

In Africa, the art of travelling is a many-splendored experience in which preparedness for the unexpected is a requisite ingredient for mental and emotional health. Only few places on Earth can be as consistently frustrating, maddening, surprising or challenging to explore or fathom.

Africa is a continent when the simplest details or arrangements of daily life can go so wrong so often that when things work correctly, the modern Africa explorer is psychologically trained by the hazards of experience to always look for a catch.

This wary attitude is part of a larger philosophy about life that many frequent travellers on the continent eventually come to adopt. This philosophy, in brief, accepts Murphy's Law--if something can go wrong, it will--as the only true law always in effect in Africa and esteems patience and forbearance as the highest virtues of man. Years ago, inveterate Africa hands--diplomats, businessmen, journalists--coined a word, "wawa," to explain in shorthand the exasperations of their trade here. The word was an acronym for "West Africa Wins Again," a catchall phrase endeavoring to explain the often inexplicable frustrations and puzzles of living in Africa.

You bought a ticket from Air Guinee for a flight to Conakry but discovered at the airport that the flight was cancelled because the president needed the plane to visit his hometown. Wawa.

You have a confirmed reservation for a hotel room in Lagos but were booted because a Nigerian village chieftain decided to throw a party and induced the management to book the entire floor of the hotel for him at a high price. Wawa.

You want to exchange some dollars for local currency in Sierra Leone but can't because most of the nation's leones are needed to pay off emerald smugglers in the northern mine and the central bank is chronically short of its own currency. Wawa.

Certainly, West Africa seems to boast more than its share of such curious circumstances. Take the international airport in Douala, Cameroon where someone long ago came up with the laudable notion of grouping arriving passengers alphabetically by their last names into separate lines for passport control.

The six kiosks are topped with big signs reading, "A-E," "F-J," "K-O," etc.

However, at any given time only two inspectors, at most, are on duty in the sleepy terminal, so that long, frozen line stretches behind four of the unmanned kiosks. But sneaking into one of the two moving lines won't help or save time, for the ever-alert inspector will shoo you away and sniff, "Sir, your last names does not begin with 'Q."

Few places are more perplexing to a stranger than Freetown, the incomparable capital of Sierra Leone. Once again upon a time, the founding fathers of the air travel in Sierra Leone decided to build the capital's Lungi International Airport on a distant spit of dirt and scrub brush located across a 15-mile-wide channel of water from the city.

Today, the only direct way to going back and forth is by ferry, a maritime adventure that can last one to four hours depending on the conditions of the vessel.

Last year, a Freetown entrepreneur had a brainstorm: Why not provide helicopter service between the airport and the city for patrons willing to pay "top leones" to save time?

The service worked well until disaster struck. Short of trained pilots and helicopter spare parts, the entrepreneur lost not one, not two, but three choppers that plunged into the channel over a three-month period, with the loss of more than 20 lives.

So everybody takes the ferry now, big shots and commoners. The trip often seems as howlingly funny as it does hair-raising.

Night and day, the decrepit, smoke-spewing vessel must chug a narrow course between the rusted hulk of numerous abandoned and half-sunk tugs and ferries in the Freetown harbor, all the while packed to overflowing with cars, trucks, assorted goats and chickens, and pedestrians loaded with heaps of luggage.

When the ferry finally gasps to a rest at the other side, the vehicles must exit the boat in reverse, because one of the vessel's hydraulic loading ramps stopped working long ago. As the captain frequently complains, "My boat is sick."

Thus, every moment of arrival is an exercise in mayhem, with screaming animals, elbowing pedestrians and horn-hocking drivers fighting to make their way to blessed land, most of them backside first. But clearly, West Africa does not have a monopoly on such incongruity or ludicrousness. Indeed, the entire continent is rife with zany inscrutability.

In the climax of the 1974 Roman Polanski film, "Chinatown," private eye Jake Gittes, played by Jack Nicholson, is restrained by a caring partner from trying to comprehend or see retribution for the murder of his lover, who was gunned down in a forbiddingly mysterious, corrupt and outlaw precinct of Lost Angeles.

The partner tells him, "Forget it, Jake. It's Chinatown."

Such a poetic and all-encompassing explanation seems perfect in its application to Africa's mysteries as well.

In Addis Ababa, the Ethiopian capital, airport and immigration officials are widely respected for their comparative competence and efficiency in a region so rife with corruption that visitors, particularly in Nigeria and Zaire, often must bolt their way like fullbacks past bribe-seeking officals.

So it is not necessarily surprising, but nonetheless maddening, that when an accident occurs, such as one two years ago when a Nairobi-bound Kenya Airways 707 plunged off the end of the runway during a harrowing emergency landing, the crack Ethiopian officals are quick to hand out customs arrival forms for the haggard survivors to fill out when they stagger in shock back to the terminal after fleeing the smoking wreck.

True story. It's Africa, Jake.

Each African country seems to present unique peculiarities in this regard. Try travelling by road to a wildlife preserve in Kenya. You will come back with a new appreciation for the truly extraordinary and scary dimensions potholes can assume.

In Kinshasa, the capital of Zaire, the phone system simply does not work anymore, and apparently no one even thinks about fixing it. Most diplomats and business folk communicate by radio and everhandy walkie-talkies strapped to their belts.

Africans, for the most part, view such inconveniences and quirks of daily living quite differently from foreigners. Many, in fact, seem to accept the continent's economic dissolution--and all that it implies--with a stoticisim like of a jovial Tanzanian businessman in Dar es Dalaam, the capital, who dreamed 20 years ago of owning a trucking and transportation empire in his nation.

During the past two decades, however, he saw his dream crushed by the spectacular failure of Tanzania's experiment in socialism and the awesome deterioration of his nation's roads. It's gotten so bad that Tanzania today enjoys fewer than 50 percent of the roads that were usable when the nation was formed in 1964.

Yet Mwakitwange said he is not the least bit disappointed.

"We in Africa just don't have this obsession with maintenance that your people have, " he says. "This building we sit in was built by the Germans in the year 18-something-or-other to last forever.

... We build our huts, a big wind blows, and five years later it's nothing but a piece of Mother Africa.

"So what do we do?" he said. "We cut down a tree and build another hut. That is our custom. We know Mother Africa will always win."

The curious ways of Mother Africa--ways both natural and man-made--do seem to prevail more often than not. Not long ago, in Harare, passen-... CONTINUE ON NEXT PAGE...

A few travellers accustomed to far less comfortable accommodations on African airliners actually oohed and ahhed as they took their seats. The plane took off about 20 minutes later after the ground crew--struggling mightily with an unwieldy piece of cargo--finally succeeded in securing it in the hold.

Shortly after takeoff, the pilot apologized for the delay--and for the foul odor suddenly permeating the spotless cabin. "We've a young elephant strapped in a cage down below," he explained with exquisite nonchalance, "travelling to a zoo in Europe."

Sure enough, for the next few hours, the telltale howl of the bewildered beast could be heard over the engines' muffled roar as the plane soared 20,000 feet above the continent.

No big deal. Forget it, Jake.



The trauma I felt the first week that I put my two-yearold daughter into her own room to sleep will not soon be forgotten. She was happy as a clam but I had to let my husband put her to bed by himself the first three or four nights. When I would walk into her room with everything dark and quiet and her lying with the covers pulled up to her chin all alone, I would just feel awful, choked up and almost crying. It obviously wasn't caused by any sadness on Meghan's part, so it had to be something in me. Of course, you've already got it figured out, but it took me two nights before I could "define that feeling". It was like watching a movie of myself the first nights back at boarding school. Being Francophone we were almost always the first to come back. A couple of times I was about the only one there. A big dorm can be pretty big and lonely when it's empty. At least the boys (my brothers) had each other and slept under the same roof. But at night the boys' dorm seemed far away. So, in short, I was feeling that chokey, homesick kind of feeling. I told my husband about it when I finally go it all figured out. He wiped away my tears after listening and now everything is fine and dandy. Meghan sleeps alone and happy. I sleep with my husband and am at peace.

I had a difficult time letting my 2 oldest attend a boarding school in Cote d'Ivoire, but I realized very soon that ICA was not Kent Academy. I've never dreamed that such an incredible school could exist. Erica and Joel love it and my 2 at home are straining at the bit for their chance to go too. We home school our kids until junior high and then "let" them go. We don't send them!
