## SIMROOTS & ROUND ROBIN PROPOSAL

#### **PROJECT SUMMARY**

- 1. During the reunion of July 1994, a request was made by the Hillcrest Alumni Association for *Simroots* to expand its membership to include the *Round Robin* which had "died" for lack of someone to publish it and for lack of funds to support it. Those attending the reunion were in favor of it, and a committee was formed for the purpose of assisting in the merger; for example, dealing with the technicalities involved with SIM, talking with the Editor of *Simroots*, who was not in attendance, etc.
- It hasn't been done alone. Over the 2. In conjunction with the Hillcrest Alumni President, the Editor felt that a decision of that magnitude could not be made legitimately by the few attending the reunion. Simroots belongs to the SIM MKs. As Editor, approved by vote in the 1985 business meeting, I believe it is important to protect their interests and maintain their desires for what Simroots should be. To merge the two papers, there would have to be a restructuring of the goals and objectives which had formed Simroots. The many letters sent to Simroots indicate clearly that its membership likes what it has become and what it provides for them. However, that does not mean there can't be change; therefore, a decision was made to conduct a survey.
  - 3. The survey was created based on consultation with several people in business and with the approval of someone

In light of this change, I ask you to welcome Karen as *Simroots'* new Editor. She will be assuming all the responsibilities that I have had as Editor, including "acting President." May God bless you all and Simroots. Cherry (Long) Sabathne - Editor in authority from both *Round Robin* and *Simroots* in a determined attempt to make it as objective as possible and to cover as many issues as possible at one time.

- 4. It was designed to determine 1) what the membership desired, 2) what the Hillcrest Alumni Association desired, 3) whether or not they would support *Simroots* in the event of a merger since the evidence showed there was not much support for *Round Robin*, 4) whether or not there should be a name change in the event of a merger, and 5) whether or not there would be someone interested in reviving *Round Robin*.
- 5. The survey was conducted and revealed four people interested in reviving the *Round Robin*. The governing body of the Hillcrest Alumni Association made a unanimous decision to withdraw its request for inclusion into *Simroots*. They feel that the *Round Robin* should be given another opportunity to succeed, thereby terminating the discussion at this time.
- 6. All donations sent with the survey by non-SIM Hillcresters will be forwarded to *Round Robin* as soon as possible. There will of course be a deduction of *Round Robin* costs incurred by the last two issues of *Simroots* which were sent to the *Round Robin* mailing list. Unless *Simroots* is otherwise notified, it will be assumed that those donations were intended for *Round Robin*.

#### NOTE:

The reunion committee made *Simroots* aware of some recommendations and suggestions which they felt would improve the publication. All of these have been dealt with. They are either 1) already incorporated into *Simroots*, 2) have been added since that time and can be seen in *Simroots*, 3) in process (such as the survey), or 4) do not fit into *Simroots*' goals and objectives.

## SURVEY **QUESTION & COMMENTS**

As you know by now, the survey motivated the revival of Round Robin making the question of merging inconsequential at this time. However, there were a few questions and comments that came out of the survey, and I thought you might be interested in read- 3. ing some of them. You may also be wondering about them.

1. Why do only Round Robin people have to pay for Simroots?

First, of all, anyone receiving Simroots should be donating towards it, not just the Hillcresters. Simroots is already being supported by SIM MKs; what we needed from the survey was concrete evidence that new people receiving it would also support it -the evidence showed us through Round Robin that people were not willing to support a newsletter. This was not a Hillcrest vs. SIM issue. It was an economic issue, which unfortunately sits at the heart of Simroots' own existence. It had to 4. be a consideration.

2. The question distinguishing between MKs and non-MKs only creates division. There really is no difference between us in terms of our experiences at Hillcrest.

The question asking about accepting only MKs into Simroots was designed to give Simroots people the opportunity to protect their "safe place for dialogue"--one of Simroots' first and most important goals. There is a distinct possibility that the freedom to dialogue outside of an MK context (which Simroots is) could be strained. It was not intended to create division. Remember, Round Robin is asking to become part of something that has already been established and successful. Our intention was to find out how the Simroots readers felt about this. Our effort is not to divide. but rather, to include as many as possible in Simroots while, at the same time, not denying its own objectives and existence.

Are you saying that non-MKs who attended Hillcrest are not invited to the reunions?

My goodness, no! The reunions are open to anyone who attended whichever school is having the reunion! Please come to them; they are designed for the purpose of getting together again with old friends from "over there"! A lot of work goes into those reunions to make them a lot of fun, so please come. This issue of Simroots includes information on a 6. There were many emotional re-Bingham Academy reunion in 1996 and an all-SIM and Hillcrest combined reunion in 1997. We'll keep you posted. The more, the merrier! (And by the way, this includes all SIM schools, not just West Africa!)

There were several pleas for news from other areas of SIM than Nigeria. Some among us feel strongly that there is already an overbalance of expression from the West Africa segment.

I couldn't agree more! Not that we want to stifle the West Africa expression; I think it's wonderful. Where are you from South America, Asia, and other SIM MK schools? This is your paper, too. Let me reassure everyone that I don't eliminate letters from other places. But I can't include them if I don't have them! It's up to you. If you receive Simroots and attended one of the other schools. how about writing to your classmates and getting them interested, and send-

ing your news to Simroots? It's a place already set up for you; why not take advantage of the opportunity to hear from each other? Thanks to the work of Mary Janish. the East Africa segment gets a number of letters into Simroots. This paper is for all SIM MKs regardless of where you were located.

What about the SIM MKs who are 5. being home schooled? Are they falling through the cracks?

> Any SIM MKs who have been home schooled are also automatically included in Simroots if they are post high school SIM MKs. Let's not let them slip through the cracks! Please send John Price any of their addresses if they are not receiving Simroots.

- sponses on both sides of the issue, all of which were valid. The strongest emotions were those that expressed that Simroots was "home," so please don't change it!
- 7. Perhaps a central E-mail address for the computer types? Stamp collecting or coin collecting or hobbies address? MK dating service? Job referrals? Would any of the above build bridges or interest? (These would have to be managed by another volunteer!)

So, there you have it! A lot of concerns, a lot of guestions, and a lot of imagination!

## FROM THENEW ROUND ROBIN EDITOR

#### Dear Friends,

My name is Steve Hart. I have been given the honor of being selected as the new Editor of the *Round Robin*. As you are aware, the voting is in and it has been determined that *Round Robin* will start up again. Since there is no point in discussing the pros and cons of combining the two publications, let's get down to business!

In order for the *Round Robin* to be the best publication possible, I believe very strongly that ALL Hillcrest alumni should be afforded the opportunity to receive our publication on a regular basis; at least three to four times per year. Your input, of course, will determine the frequency, quality and distribution of our publication.

The *Round Robin* was distributed in the past to the approximately 200 alumni that paid a \$5.00 subscription fee. Some contributed more and some the exact amount required, but there are over 800 more Hillcrest Alumni on file in the data base who did not subscribe, for whatever reason, that I would like to see receive our publication. To bring matters into perspective, it is interesting to note that there are even more, perhaps another thousand or so alumni that have been lost due to lack of a proper address or who provided no address at all.

Publication of the *Round Robin* takes money (a tired phrase, I know) but necessary to mention, nonetheless. I have thought long and hard about this and came up with a few suggestions. With the new start, I would like to incorporate a donation system rather than a dues subscription in the hope of attracting more support by reaching a broader audience. The *Round Robin* donations that were sent to *Simroots* with the survey will be forwarded to *Round Robin* along with the record of whose donation it was after the accounts between *Round Robin* and *Simroots* are settled. Of all the people who have attended Hillcrest, we have an enormous pool of talented people who could support the *Round Robin* in many ways other than just money. The following are just a few examples:

#### FUND RAISING

Surely someone out there is talented in the art of soliciting monetary contributions from interested organizations. **COMPUTER STUFF** 

It takes modern computers, printers, scanners, fax machines, printing equipment to produce a quality publication. Got any lying around? Know anyone who does?

#### **ARTICLE CONTRIBUTION**

Do you have any interesting stories to tell? Items of interest? Personal news? Announcements? Send them in; we need all we can get.

#### **OTHER TALENT**

Are you a publisher, editor, layout artist, artist, writer, psychologist, doctor, lawyer, whatever? The more we know about those willing to contribute their talents or advice, the better.

#### CONTACT PERSONS

Are you one of those people who knows and keeps in touch with other alumni? Would you be willing to let them know how much we are interested in them? Let us know.

I could ramble on but would rather you let me know what it is you could contribute or suggest in order to produce and distribute a quality publication. Call or write and let me know your thoughts and suggestions.

The Round Robin is and has always been a forum for all Hillcrest alumni. Because we all come from various backgrounds, have different experiences, and have changed our outlook on things after graduation, it is important that freedom of expression and respect for all viewpoints be considered. I say this because I don't want anyone to feel excluded just because they think they don't "fit in." The only requirement to "fit in" is that you be a Hillcrest alumnus. That's it! It's that simple. No complex rules and regulations, just a forum for whatever is on your mind. Anyone wanting to receive the Round Robin may do so as long as you support the publication. All are welcome!



It has taken this little missionary boy a long time to process through his past. As I sit here trying to decide what to write, I have a strong desire to make it personal. Yes, I love to read what has become of all of us. Yet the bare facts most of us relate

leave a lot of unanswered questions in my mind. Often over the years I have felt an intense sense of loss and an intense need for the relationships established in our youth. I was distanced from many of you when I left K.A. a year early to attend Hillcrest and live at home. And again, not living at the hostel created its own separation. Yet, it has always been such that each of you became my greatest sense of loss over the ensuing years; especially moving into adulthood. Ironically, the trauma of adolescence and the lack of identity voided any benefit of the contact I did have with George Cail at Columbia Bible College and Steve Harling at SIM, New Jersey. Even my opportunity of at-

#### EMERGING BY GRACE

Don Price - K.A., H.C. ... CONTINED FROM OPPOSITE PAGE... tending one of the first reunions was a shallow experience, as though living in the shadow of a dark and lingering cloud. I lived in a vacuum of the issues affecting me since I left Africa until about four years ago.

Letters Never Sent was the first ray of light to beam into my consciousness and awaken my troubled emotions. As I moved into responsible adulthood and involvement in my church, my weaknesses became painfully apparent. As the personal issues of approval, performance, a distorted picture of God as an uncaring Authority, and a very low self-esteem surfaced to expose all that was holding me back emotionally, relationally, and spiritually, it has been three painful, slow years of gaining understanding. During this time Simroots was very important to me and caused me to document much of my thinking in writing; most of which I have not contributed. I am emerging into my own, at last, with a much clearer perspective on my life. I am learning to take risks in following the lead of a very different God than I have known in my past. As I experience a very loving and intimate Father who knows no limit in initiating the good things of growth which lead me more fully into His will, I await with eager expectation His moving me away from self and into service of others and the resulting true fulfillment, purpose, and joy of being yielded. I still daydream now and then of surprise encounters with you. But now it is enhanced with the hope of relating on a spiritual level with true liberation freedom and an experience of a genuine blessing.

WHY? Don Price - K.A., H.C. 205

I know, it's tough that boarding school gets so much of the blame when it comes to explaining the difficulty in internalizing God's truth for so many of us. Yet those were the formative years. What we learned there about ourselves and God seems to have had the most lasting implications. Much of the bad memories was successfully repressed and lost, but the imprint on the emotions remained. In fact, it was this early focus on feelings which later patterned our lives. That is why before my "discerning days" my experience at boarding school was easily summed up as, "There was some good and some bad as in most things."

Yet, the transition into adulthood and my emerging involvement with responsibilities brought to the surface all the limitations of character. It was this stark reality which demanded explanation. How was it I had become so inadequate? As all the weaknesses were exposed, there was a choice ... to remain in bondage or to seek the gain.

This is the crucial point of difference between what we see demonstrated in the world's way of healing and the Christian's path to healing. To "remain in bondage" is to end the process in blame. To "seek the gain" is to pursue the process in reliving all that latent pain and learning to express it in a cleansing way, allowing God to lead you through that "valley of tears" and continuing past it into the equally painful process of revelation and confession of all the behavioral repercussions borne from that conflict in our emotions. God is remarkably competent in customizing this process to each person's unique experience.

In my experience, time seemed my worst enemy. It was and is a painfully slow process of understanding marked by much confusion and frustration, embedded in an often serious depression. But I suspect the slowness will become a reality of God's sincere gentleness and providential foresight for thoroughness.

I love to write and I feel fortunate to be able to see progress in my record of words. But I also feel fortunate to not have contributed all I might have along the way. For surely, anytime one expresses himself he reveals "where is he at". I thank God you have been spared some of my uncomfortable levels of learning. Learning to express ourselves correctly falls into my "pendulum theory". We tend to go from one extreme to another before we find a balance. Nevertheless, we need to become transparent. It is indeed a healing process to grow up in the Lord.

Yet this in itself compels an awareness for the need of expressed compassion; in essence, expressing to others the same grace you received. We need to allow each other the freedom we all need from legalistic judgments and allow God to work out His own unique miracle in our lives. I assure you there were many encounters with legalistically minded saints which seemed to hinder my way and actually increased the level of painful aloneness. Yet again I'm more certainly beginning to see God's faithfulness in working all together for good.

In regard to my own confession of "uncomfortable levels of learning," I fear that I may discourage others from sharing. Please do write and let us minister to each other. It is just that I am one of those overly sensitive types and am easily embarrassed at my own awkwardness of expression and exposure; as though wearing my heart on my sleeve. But this remains a vital part in the healing of emotions; to get it all out and lay it on the table for God to remove the chaff. Simroots is representative of our mission family, the origin of our experience, and it should be the most appropriate place to deal with these issues. It is the place to come back "home" and settle up! To reach an agreement with each other on our varied experiences.

bodies as living sacrifices," experientially receiving an ongoing sanctifying grace which enables us to extend grace to others in putting their interests above ours. Wow! I am amazed at the wealth of expression!

I am intrigued at the introduction of the article on Satanic influence and the other responses to it. I love it! This is what it's all about . . . hammering out the truth. God's recent awakening in my small church has radically introduced me to the power of prayer (as Carol's article mentioned). As well, my last few months have been a total immersion in a study of God's grace (as Becky's article referred to). At the same time. I have interspersed the reading of two books on the subject of demonology and Satanic bondage (which Sue's article mentioned). It has been a longstanding cry of mine to have God make some sense out of Christianity. I finally feel as though some pieces are coming together.

Let me offer another angle. I'll really have to strive to keep this simple. It seems to me that Satanic influence is largely played out in our minds and is largely concerned with one lie--the lie of legalism. He reinforces this through our own fallen nature, society, and even in the Church. In our case we got a head start in "the school of performance" in the setting of boarding school. The complication was that this perception of legalism in the physical dimension of rules and regulations guickly transferred itself to our spiritual perception because our mission's environment was taken for granted by us to represent God in His fullness. All the early hurts and pains added up to an unpleasant experience of God.

In time this played itself out in an effective transfer of position in our minds. Satan had won. We were to receive all of God's truths through the filter of the "old law." That is, we were

to suffer the effects of the law as ones who be nice if I could just stay in a mindset had not been redeemed. We were to see all the admonitions of Scripture as hopelessly beyond our reach. All the promises of God were meant for others (probably the nationals our parents came to serve). Although many of us had asked Jesus into our hearts, we became Little Christians raised in the world system of approval through performance. Satan had placed our minds under the unredeemed effect of the law to live our lives without power and even be provoked to sin. For you see, it is what you "believe" that counts. The affirmation we received for compliance and the disappointment expressed otherwise reinforced the idea of a works orientation.

All this, of course, occurred in a less adequate environment, lacking a more measured parental grace. As well, this is a common condition, of varied degree, to all mankind who have fallen under a mis- you find a problem with submitting to representation of grace, or lack an understanding of it.

Grace is a perpetual act of God, not limited to salvation, but also an ongoing act of treating us in mercy without reference to what we deserve, solely according to His infinite goodness and sovereign purpose because of His love. It comes to us from God at the high price of Jesus' death. But in that death Jesus paid not finite, narrow minded, and un-omnisonly for our salvation, but also for every answer to prayer and every blessing we need for the sanctification process. The full dimension of the gospel as expressed by Jerry Bridges is, "We are brought into God's kingdom by grace; we are sanctified by grace; we receive both temporal and spiritual blessings by grace; we are called to serve and enabled to serve by grace; we receive strength to endure trials by grace; and finally, we are glorified by grace. The entire Christian life is lived so that you might come to quickly under the reign of God's grace."

So you see, this is the other position available to us in our minds--the position of grace, united with Christ. The misrep- where all has been provided. of grace. Because in it is real freedom from a lot of personal calamity. But, alas, herein is the essence of Christianity: "Falling away from grace"! If I could stay in [the mindset of] grace I could abandon myself to a life of devotion and service from sheer gratitude that God has already done it all. He's not even keeping score of merit or demerit. But this is where the ongoing influence of Satan comes to bear. Satan's abiding principle is to take as much ground as we give him. When we take God's Word seriously and take up the armor, which we are free to do, we are really just appropriating God's grace by faith. We are trusting in a victory already won and submitting to His providence in full and utter dependence.

This is where prayer comes in. If becoming utterly dependent, there is always this last one straw to break Satan's bondage to a mindset of performance and thinking it's all up to you. Prayer! I've plumbed some pretty deep depths but I haven't yet been in a hole where I couldn't pray a last desperate cry or tear. Some answers seem mighty slow in coming, but then I'm pretty cient! There is joy in the goodness of God. There is peace with God in submission to His sovereign purpose. And there is an increasing experiential freedom from the bondages of my past in Satan's mindset of performance to earn God's approval. There is increasing freedom to make good and right choices in obedience and surrender.

One more thing: In the act of embracing the disciplines of our faith we actually make grace our experience. It seems a mystery, but by choosing to do the right things, out of gratitude, I actually receive more grace. It follows that the more I want grace, the more I will want to embrace the disciplines of faith. Ours is an active faith compelled by gratitude and sustained by the receiving of grace even as we practice it.

Christianity is a win-win situation propelled by the receiving and giving of grace. Let us resist being a misrepresentation of grace and permitting Satan an easy task in casting his curse of a mind dominated by legalistic performance. We have the promise of God's grace being sufficient. Let's pray for an ongoing and deeper understanding of it so that it might become more our experience of real freedom and victory. A dawning understanding of God's grace is transforming me. Grace permits me to see my weakness as opportunity to experience the power of God. It is turning my "ought to's" into "want to's." Grace is God saying, "I have always wanted you, but because of who I am and what you are, I had to do it all. Because I had to pay so high a price for you, I have to have your full dependence. In this favor, I have given you a complete inheritance. I'm afraid you saw only a part of it when you came to me for your salvation, as though you thought it was limited to a promise for later. Someone stepped in and told you it wasn't for now; that you could not receive it until you had grown up. But I am God, I gave it to you. I did intend for you to have it now. You need it now. Do not leave it in the bank. Go get some now and put it in your pocket. Only believe what I am telling you and act on it (faith). Resist that someone or someones. Come and receive what is

yours. In the act of doing so you will have all that you need. And you will increasingly realize that it is more than enough. It is sufficient. Be content. Only acknowledge that it is I, God, who has done this for you. Only acknowledge that it is I alone who can and has done this for you!"

Thank you, God! Thank you that I am not a slave in the world's marketplace of approval through performance. I have been set free and I am rich. I will apply myself to this new way of life and honor You, my Father. I will submit and conduct myself as a son of the King. I will join You in Your sovereign purpose and enjoy your kindness! I will join You in Your battles to defend Your kingdom. I will even suffer and die for You. I am at peace with You!

Jesus said, "If you love me, obey my commands," but He also said, "Apart from me you can do nothing." As well, we know that all good things come from Him. Dependence comes before service. For Him to "do" and to "give" requires total dependence. Grace says He has already "done" and already "given" us all things! Where does that leave us? The only things I can see are gratitude and dependence. We receive when we depend. As we receive we will be filled with gratitude. So that leaves us with just "dependence." Even this, if you insist on seeing it as something "required" of you, can be had by prayer! It's amazing! Take a look at grace; it will astound you!

It seems to me the problem is not one of attaining unto God's grace. It is one of "falling away from grace"! How does this happen? Here comes old Satan! That same old lie: "Anything for free is too good to be true." He wants to put your mindset under the old law and all its legalism which says you must work/perform to gain any approval.

Grace does it for you. It impels you, enables you, and sustains you . . . to be vigilant against Satan's efforts, to be obedient, to persevere, to be faithful, to be all you can be for God! So what will it be for you? Grace or law?

I'm convinced! We need prayer for an ongoing deeper understanding of grace. We also need to recognize enough about Satan so we can quickly identify his threat to our "falling away from grace."

By the way, the law for us who are redeemed is good. It offers moral direction for our freedom in grace.

In a previous Open Dialogue, the following statement was made: "What hurting people need most in their lives is not Bible verses or even sympathy. The real need is to have their injustices and pain seriously acknowledged and regretted. I believe only the Holy Spirit can produce this attitude genuinely." The more I've thought about this, the more I think it packs a powerful punch!

Not too long ago, I was part of an audience listening to two video series, one by Gary Smalley called "Hidden Keys to Loving Relationships," the other by Neil Anderson called "Resolving Personal Conflicts." Gary Smalley talked about how a wounded spirit produces rebellion. But the person who inflicted the wound can heal the wounded spirit by acknowledging his part in the damage and then asking for forgiveness. Seeing the other person as much too valuable to hurt enables him to humble himself to ask for forgiveness. Neil Anderson describes forgiveness as, "Resolving to live with the consequences of the person's sin and not using the past against him." (I notice the lack of reference to emotion.) This is the best definition of forgiveness I've ever heard particularly because it's an act of the will, not the emotions. Like love, forgiveness is an act of the will.

So, with that as the background, this is what I have to say: I think it's




